1 Aleliopolis [anc. Egyp. Iunu: now Tell Hisn. nr Cairo, Egypt]. An ancient Egyptian city, known in the Bible as On, which was the capital of the 13th Lower Egyptian nome (administrative province) and a cult centre of the sun-god, in its various guises (Re, Atum, Khepri). The symbol of 4 Heliopolis was the benben, the precursor of the pyramid and obelisk. 6 which represented the primeval hill upon which the sun first rose. The oldest 7 monolithic benben found at Heliopolis dates to the 6th dynasty. An obelisk of Sesostris I (reo 1971 1926 BC) still stands on the 9 site; two other obelisks of Heliopolitan origin M 'Cleopatra's needles' M are 0 now in London and New York. Remains of a temenos wall and chapel 1 reliefs testify to the city's importance as a religious centre as early as the Archaic period. I NHOTEP, a high priest of Heliopolis under the 3 3rd dynasty, was instrumental in the creation of the Step Pyramid at Sappara. Excavations at Heliopolis have produced evidence of various New Kingdom 4 temples, dating to the reions of Amenophis III. Sethos I. Ramesses II and IX 6 and Merenptah. There are also remains of tombs of 6th-dynasty high priests 7 (south-east of the Sesostris I obelisk). a necropolis of the Ramessid and Late 8 Periods (at the nearby site of Ard el-Natam) and a series of tombs of 9 Mnevis-bulls (north-east of the obelisk).
